Food suggestions from local lan Harvey (TOKO)

There are a few places to eat that are within walking distance from the hotel in Heber City. They are

Don Pedro's Mexican Restaurant - this is a basic but decent Mexican restaurant that serves the usual Mexican dishes. It's about a 3 minute walk. 11am-9pm.

Little India Fine Dining - this is an Indian restaurant that is located about 3 minutes walking from the hotel. I have eaten there once and didn't find it very good, but I have a lot of friends who love it. So, I am wondering if I need to go back and try it again as I ate there shortly after they opened. 4pm-9:30pm.

The Hub - this place recently expanded greatly and changed their menu. They serve food all times of the day and have a very wide "American" menu. I haven't been there for years, but it's totally OK. It's about a 2 minute walk from the hotel. 7am-9pm.

Betty's Cafe - I haven't seen it or eaten there, but the listing looks OK. Breakfast and "American" food. 7am-3pm.

Jade's Cafe - Jade's has been there for about 8 months. The food is amazing. It's expensive and often full of Park City people. 4 minute walk from the hotel. 7am-4pm.

For dinner, Don Pedros is the obvious safe choice as while the food is not exceptional, nothing is at all bad. I think everyone likes Don Pedros, but foodies don't love it.
